

The Illinois Secretary of State (SoS) provides an annual count of Commercial Driver's Licenses (CDLs) issued during the calendar year to DCEO staff. This report summarizes the data provided along with information on truck driver training funded by WIOA Title IB.

#### Key takeaways

- the number of active licenses issued by the Secretary of State (SoS) increased at the same rate as 2018 (1.1%, or approximately 4,900)
- 100% of the net increase is due to Class A CDLs, the category covering the heaviest trucks and tractor trailers, which increased by nearly 5,500 or 1.7%, while Class B and Class C licenses had reductions of 0.1% and 4.1%, respectively

A breakout of CDLs issued and renewed (see the table on p. 2) indicates:

- Over 400 new CDLs were issued to individuals that did not already have an Illinois driver license of any kind.
- Over 27,700 drivers already licensed in Illinois upgraded to a CDL or upgraded an existing CDL to a heavier weight class or added special endorsements, such as Hazardous Material transport.
  - SoS cannot break out how many of these are upgrades from a non-CDL
  - We can deduce the majority of upgrades were to a higher level CDL or to add an endorsement, otherwise the 27,700 upgrades would lead to more than the overall increase of 5,500 Class A CDLs.
- The number of straight CDL renewals, those that did not involve an upgrade, increased by nearly 1,200 or 1.7% over the number of renewals in 2018 and topped 70,000 for the first time since 2011.

*Note – the WIOA Truck Driver Training Activity table indicates the number of WIOA-enrolled individuals in each of these activities at some point in the Program Year, and the data for “Completed Training” and beyond is comprised of participants that exited WIOA. The people counted in each category are not necessarily the same individuals.*

WIOA enrollment in truck driver training and the number of trainees entering training-related employment edged up slightly in PY18, following a steady decline for both between PY15-PY17. This may signal the low point of enrollment decline attributed to the strength of the overall economy, where fewer workers view truck driving as an alternate career.

Other than the increase in Entering Employment, the most notable data trend from July 2015 to June 2019 is the significant narrowing of the gap between the number of WIOA participants that completed training and the number earning CDLs each year. The number of WIOA providers declined from 94 to 81 over this same period. It is possible this reduction removed some programs with lower success rates.
